



FIRST READING Acts 8:26-40

All sit.

A Reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

An angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Get up and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." (This is a wilderness road.) So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of Candace, gueen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. Then the Spirit said to Philip, "Go over to this chariot and join it." So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" He replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this: "Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer, so he does not open his mouth. In his humiliation justice was denied him. Who can describe his generation? For his life is taken away from the earth." The eunuch asked Philip, "About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, "Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?" He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region, he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

SECOND READING 1 John 4:7-21

A Reading from the First letter of John.

Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us. By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. And we have seen and do testify that the Father

has sent his Son as the Savior of the world. God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God. So we have known and believe the love that God has for us. God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgment, because as he is, so are we in this world. There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love. We love because he first loved us. Those who say, "I love God," and hate their brothers or sisters, are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen. The commandment we have from him is this: those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also.

Announcements



Expert day care for infants and children younger than 5 during the 10 a.m. church service is provided by Samira Sameni, a preschool teacher at our Saint Andrew's Children's Center. Drop-off is upstairs in the Children's Center's 2nd floor Conference Room.

Sunday School for children ages 5 to 12 during the 10 am service will be happening outdoors on the grass in front of the church for our stepping stone project (see the article that follows for more information). The children themselves picked the designs for the stones based on listening to Genesis 1-2. Last week some of the children made their stepping stones and this Sunday they will unmold their stepping stone and clean the concrete off the tiles, while children who missed last week will lay out their mosaic tiles following a pre-made colored sketch and after church will mix and pour their concrete into the mold. Parents, we ask for your help in the concrete pouring stage so things go smoolthly. Due to the potential for messiness, please have your child wear clothes that you wouldn't mind getting a little dirty. After the stones are done, we'll display them outside on the patio so everyone can admire them. Later we'll be placing the stepping stones in the landscaped beds that surround the church. If you would like information about the kits and tiles used to make the stepping stones so you can make these yourself at home or if you have any questions or feedback about Sunday School, please contact our Sunday School teacher, Tammy Smecker-Hane (tsmecker@cox.net).

Earth Day Activity – Stepping Stones



We have a special activity planned for families on Sunday, Apr 21, in celebration of Earth Day on the following Monday. The Sunday School children and families will be making mosaic stepping stones for the landscaping around the church! We will provide some sample designs that celebrate God's creation and the diversity of plants, animals, people and landscapes found on Earth. The children will plan out their designs

and arrange the tiles during Sunday School and, after the 10 a.m. service, parents and children will get together to mix and pour the concrete to finish the job. It will be a fun and lasting way to celebrate nature and leave your individual artistic stamp on our church's landscape. We'll also have some extra kits for folks who want to join in the fun even if they don't have children in Sunday School. Families who cannot be with us on Apr 21 can make up the activity on the following week. Please let our Sunday School teacher, Tammy Smecker-Hane (tsmecker@cox.net), know if you have any questions or plan to need the make-up event. (Due to the potential for messiness, please wear clothes that you wouldn't mind getting a little dirty that week.)

CAMP STEVENS As you begin planning your children's summer activities, please consider Camp Stevens, an amazing summer camp and retreat center run by the Episcopal Church in the mountains east of San Diego just outside the historic town of Julian. Many young people at Saint Andrew's have gone to Camp Stevens repeatedly for summer camp, and some loved their experiences so much they could hardly wait to return as teens to work there as camp counselors. Feel free to ask, the Browning, Hane, Caprini and Trimpey families about their children's recent experiences.

Camp Stevens is renowned for their inclusivity, celebration of diversity, fabulous outdoor experiences, and their farm-to-table kitchen. As Camp Stevens website explains, "We work to ensure each camper leaves with a greater sense of self-love, confidence, spirituality, and creativity from a week of being accepted as they are in a compassionate community. We believe that by exploring together in a group they develop a greater sense of empathy and responsibility to others and ready to face new challenges in the future. We hope that they feel inspired by their time in nature and have a deeper desire to become stewards of the earth.

Summer Camp is for children ages 8 to 17, and they are grouped by age into different Adventure Groups. Each group cooks out over a campfire and sleeps under the stars at least once a week. Older campers may challenge themselves on the high ropes course, and younger campers aim for new heights on the climbing wall. All campers have the option to try classic camp activities such as swimming, hiking, archery, and arts & crafts. For the more adventurous youth, Wilderness Camp is available for teens aged 13 to 17 and, depending on the particular week, involves backpacking either in the mountains and valleys around San Diego County or kayaking around Catalina Island. In addition, you can make pick-up/drop-off easy by signing up for the bus that departs/returns from Saint Michael's Episcopal Church in Anaheim.

A great way to introduce young children to Camp Stevens and make them comfortable with sleep-away camp is to take your entire family to Camp Stevens for one of their **weekend Family Camps**. You'll stay together in bunk beds in a room in one of the lodges and explore what's growing in the gardens, visit the farm animals, and enjoy counselor-led activities like hiking or archery or maybe even go on a local winery tour. The next Family Camps happen over Mother's Day weekend (May 10-12) and Memorial Day weekend (May 25-27).
