

FIRST READING

Isaiah 6:1-13

A Reading from the book of the prophet Isaiah.

In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lofty; and the hem of his robe filled the temple. Seraphs were in attendance above him; each had six wings: with two they covered their faces, and with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew. And one called to another and said: "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory." The pivots on the thresholds shook at the voices of those who called, and the house filled with smoke. And I said: "Woe is me! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips; yet my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts!" Then one of the seraphs flew to me, holding a live coal that had been taken from the altar with a pair of tongs. The seraph touched my mouth with it and said: "Now that this has touched your lips, your guilt has departed and your sin is blotted out." Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" And I said, "Here am I; send me!"

And he said, "Go and say to this people: 'Keep listening, but do not comprehend; keep looking, but do not understand.' Make the mind of this people dull, and stop their ears, and shut their eyes, so that they may not look with their eyes, and listen with their ears,

and comprehend with their minds, and turn and be healed." Then I said, "How long, O Lord?" And he said: "Until cities lie waste without inhabitant, and houses without people, and the land is utterly desolate; until the Lord sends everyone far away, and vast is the emptiness in the midst of the land. Even if a tenth part remain in it, it will be burned again, like a terebinth or an oak whose stump remains standing when it is felled." The holy seed is its stump.

A Reading from Paul's First letter to the Church in Corinth.

Now I would remind you, brothers and sisters, of the good news that I proclaimed to you, which you in turn received, in which also you stand, through which also you are being saved, if you hold firmly to the message that I proclaimed to you-unless you have come to believe in vain. For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me. For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me has not been in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them-though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. Whether then it was I or they, so we proclaim and so you have come to believe.

NICENE CREED







Many parishioners were inspired by the words of the Right Rev. Mariann Edgar Budde, the Episcopal Bishop of Washington, DC, in her sermon at the National Prayer Service the morning after the Presidential inauguration at Washington National Cathedral (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=xwwaEuDeqM8), when she prayed for unity in our country and asked President Trump to show mercy to vulnerable immigrants and LGBTQ+ people. Her words were prophetic and, similar to biblical prophets in the past, not everyone was pleased with her message. She received some very negative feedback and even death threats. Therefore we

would like counter that message and show our support and deep appreciation to her by creating a quilted wall hanging (as pictured here) as a gift. Its intended reminder is that Christ, his church and his people can be the light in the darkness. If there is enough interest we will create one wall hanging to send to Bishop Budde and one to keep at our own church.

There are numerous ways you can help. If you would like to be a part of the group cutting the fabric and/or sewing the quilt, please let Tammy Smecker-Hane (tsmecker@cox.net) know ASAP, and we'll set up days/times to work on it. If you would like to donate cotton fabric – shades of blue from the very darkest to the lightest as well as whites are needed, and useful pieces can be as small as $15^{\circ} \times 5^{\circ}$ – simply bring the fabric in and give it to Tammy on Sunday. If you wish to donate to defray the cost of materials and postage, please give it to Tammy or leave a check in the plate with "Quilt Project" in the memo line.
